FHN covers 7 counties in Northwest Illinois including a 194 bed acute care hospital and multiple ambulatory sites. From 2001 to September 2008, Nancy Cutler served as Vice President of Patient Services and CNO of Marianjoy Rehabilitation Hospital. Marianjoy's rehabilitation services are offered at locations throughout the greater Chicagoland area. The majority of her academic career has been at Illinois Wesleyan University where she has been a leader within the University and professional nursing community. At Illinois Wesleyan, she has served as president of Phi Kappa Phi Honorary and chaired the University's major policy council. Dr. Hartweg also has held many positions in the regional or state Illinois Nurses' Association and the Theta Pi Chapter of Sigma Theta Tau, the International Honor Society of Nursing. She has also chaired the Illinois Association of Colleges of Nursing, the organization of all baccalaureate and higher degree

nursing programs in the State of Illinois. Dr. Hartweg is an active scholar with an interest in women's self-care. Although her early research focused on self-care of healthy Anglo and African-American women, more recent investigations are on health and self-care behaviors of Spanish-speaking Latinas from Mexico and Central America. The majority of her academic and practice career has been dedicated to maternal-child health nursing and perinatal nursing.

Jim Renneker, MSN, RN, FACHE is currently serving as the Chief Operating Officer/Chief Nursing Officer for Weiss Memorial Hospital, Chicago. Prior to his appointment at Weiss, he served as Vice President of Nursing at NorthShore University Healthcare-Highland Park Hospital from 2002-2009. Responsibilities included hospital operations, Nursing, and Patient Care Services. Throughout his tenure at NorthShore, he held corporate responsibility for Behavioral Health Services; for inpatient/outpatient/adult and adolescent; Pharmacy Services; inpatient/outpatient and retail; and Infection Control. Mr. Renneker has been a licensed professional nurse over 30 years; has held leadership positions as Vice President of Clinical Services, Vice President of Patient Care Services, Interim Provost for a College of Nursing (BSN Program), and System Executive Director and Administrator.
